

- Call to order (Vice President) The meeting was called to order at 1:25 PM. Members present were Bill Kendall, Byron Doner, J.C. Banks, and Gerald Franklin
- Treasurer's Report (Vice President) Since the Treasurer was absent, the Vice President gave the financial report. The board of directors had previously approved investing some of the club's surplus funds into another CD.
- Web site report and recommendations (J.C. Banks) We are receiving 500 + hits per day on the Saltfork website.
- Statewide meeting/picnic (G. Franklin) The statewide meeting is scheduled for the 10<sup>th</sup> of May at the Cleveland County Fairgrounds in Norman. It will be conducted in a hammer-in format, so plan to bring your portable forges. The meeting is open to all current SCABA members. Ron Lehenbauer will invite the Oklahoma Farrier's Association to attend also. Mike George will coordinate the picnic lunch. Plans will be finalized at the next board meeting.

## I have an Idea – Where do I go from Here?

If you are getting started in blacksmithing, you have probably looked at enough work of others to develop an idea on what you would like to build. Many times this is a project that seems complicated and you are somewhat intimidated by the size or complexity of the project. There is an old saying that "it won't get done until you start it" and this applies to almost any project. Any project, no matter how complicated, can be broken down into steps, and each step is not nearly as complicated. Most of the steps in a complicated project are versions of small projects, such as the iron in the hat projects you do for regional meetings. The steps in construction of your project could be as follows:

- 1. Use books, magazines, photos, etc. to arrive at a desired project. Many times a combination of elements in different projects can be used to arrive at your final project.
- 2. Get the project down on paper. It doesn't have to be in scale at this time, or even full sized, just experiment by sketching different versions to get the overall look. A chalk board or dry erase board will allow you to modify as you go. Pay particular attention to proposed joinery, a pass through, rivets, collars, or forge welding many times will become the focal point of the project.
- 3. Once you have the project finalized in your mind, start sketching it out with a chalk marker **full size** on a piece of rusty metal or paper that you can later transfer to the rusty metal. The metal is used as a template to lay the hot iron on and tweak it to fit the pattern. Make sure your borders are square and the outside dimensions are correct.
- 4. By this time, you will know what size metal to use for each component, so start forging and bending metal to fit the pattern. The borders should be constructed first followed by the forged elements. As each piece is finished, lay it on the pattern, and you will see your many small elements start to combine to form the finished project. This is a good confidence builder because you begin to realize how the project will look when finished.
- 5. Try to match the forms closely, especially when it is required to have a mirror image from one side of the project to the other. If more than a couple of scrolls are needed, it may be better to build a scroll form to provide uniformity, but remember, if it is too uniform, it looks machine made.
- 6. Many times when you are using pass throughs and forge welding, it is necessary to almost think in reverse. Peter Ross explained this in a conference I attended, that you need to visualize how the piece will go together, and put it together in your mind to avoid having to re-do something because you did it out of sequence. For example, a branched scroll will usually need to be forge welded before you bend the scroll. This involves forging the taper in both scrolls, then determining the exact length of the scroll to arrive at the forge welded location.
- 7. Slight tweaking of the metal to fit the frame is usually required, and can be done cold with a set of forks and bending wrenches. At this time it is usually better to wire brush and clean up the elements rather than wait until it is all assembled.
- 8. Next comes the final joining of the project. All components should be made, some inner joints will be made, and it is time to put it all together. Again, think the process through to get the order the joints need to be made. There are many sources on how to make collars, pass throughs, or tenon joints, and if you are not familiar with these, make practice joints

until you feel comfortable with the joint.

9. After a final clean-up and finish (again there are many references to finishing procedures) the project will be ready and you will be amazed that you did it yourself. Now, it's time to find something even more difficult, and challenge yourself again.



At noon we all enjoyed a very good BBQ lunch along with pie, cake and ice-cream for desert.


